
Stories of Christianity

To explore the story of Daniel and relate this to religious persecution today.






If someone told

This actually happened to a man in the Bible called Daniel. It is a famous story.




Have you ever heard the story of Daniel and the Lions' Den?


What do you think might happen?







Daniel heard about the decree but continued to pray to God three times a day at his window, just as he had always done. He knew that worshipping God was more important than any law a man could make.



The vice-regents went to Daniel's house, knowing exactly when he would be praying. They immediately went to tell King Darius that they had found Daniel going against the new decree.









At first light, Darius raced back to the den. To his utter amazement, he saw Daniel standing among the lions - and he was completely unharmed! "What happened?" asked the king.







For persecuted Christians, just like for Daniel, their relationship with God is the most important thing in their lives. The Bible tells Christians that even though they might face persecution for their beliefs, God will always be with them and will always use a situation for good, no matter how difficult it may seem. The Bible also states that those who suffer for believing in Jesus will be richly rewarded in Heaven.
