



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The Rich Fool


Jesus was talking to a big crowd of people. Someone shouted out, "Teacher, tell my brother to give me my fair share of the family inheritance."

Jesus answered, "What makes you think I will be a judge or mediator for you?" He turned to the rest of the crowd and said, "Take care! Protect yourself against the least bit of greed." Then he told them this parable:

A certain rich man had lots of land that produced masses of crops. He said to himself, 'I have so many crops that they will not all fit in my barn. I know! I'll build a new and bigger barn. I'll keep all my grain and goods and then I'll be able to sit back and retire knowing I am a rich man. I'll enjoy myself and all my riches.' Just then, God spoke to him and said, 'You fool! Tonight you will die and your barn full of goods - who gets it?' That is what happens when you fill

your barn with goods instead of with God.

Jesus was teaching a group of people about how God wants them to live their lives. He taught them many things. "Whoever hears my teachings and puts them into practice," he said, "is like a wise builder who builds his house on a foundation of solid rock. Next, a temple worker was walking along the same road and also saw the same man. He carried on going without stopping, just as the priest had done.


A little later, a man from Samaria was

Jesus was talking with a group of people. He told them a parable:

'We have done as you have said,' said the servants, 'but there are still plenty more places for people at the feast.'

'Go out along the back roads and make everyone you see come to my feast,' said the king. 'Not one of my original guests will get even a bite of my food.'





The Pharisee and the Tax Collector

But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not look up to heaven but instead looked downcast, and said, 'God, I am a sinner. Have mercy on me.'

"When they both went home, it was the tax collector who was pleasing to God and not the Pharisee," said Jesus.
