


Identity and Belonging

...respects other people.


...learns about life in other parts of the world.

- to respect other religions,
 cultures and traditions
- to communicate with other people, learn from them and about them
- to look after the environment
- · to help other people less well-off

India is one of the fastest developing countries in the world. Some of the people who live there are among the poorest in the world. More than four million children have to work.

These children may have to beg, or scavenge for recyclable items in rubbish heaps. Some work in factories, shops and restaurants. Sometimes the work is very dangerous.

Every year, thousands of tons of electronic waste such as old computers, phones and fridges are exported to India. Adults and children work at the scrap yards.
