Robots, Bridges and Eggs Engineering Challenge for Girls

An after school club run by professionals from Cummins Power Generators has encouraged girls at RAPS to explore and develop their engineering skills and has caught the imagination of girls from Years 1 to 6, who are now keen to do more in the subject at a time when there are only around 10% of women working as engineers in the UK.

The girls were set a series of tasks to work out using their own current skills plus advice from their Cummins tutors. The aim was to show how fun and exciting science and engineering is through innovating, creating and building real-life models. Working in mixed-age teams, the girls tackled a number of tasks that included using K'nex building kits, making a walking robot, as well as a drain pipe and cup stack challenge. They also built a sturdy miniature bridge using basic materials and worked out a way to protect an egg when it was dropped from a series of increasing heights using rubber bands, lollipop sticks, string, pipe-cleaners and plastic bags.



As there are currently not many girls who decide to take up engineering as a career, it is important to give the girls an understanding of physics, mechanics and science at an early age so they begin to develop a solid foundation of engineering experience. The Cummins project also encourages collaboration and teamwork, helps develop problemsolving and trouble-shooting skills, and have fun with STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and maths). The children found the workshops fascinating and made the following comments:

"I really want to be an engineer when I am older. I loved making the robots and solving the problem of how to drop an egg from a height without it smashing. It is amazing fun making the bridges and trying to get them to be strong enough," (Ruby, Year 5) "I really enjoy making things. It is interesting." (Sienna, Year 1)

STEAM topics and projects are important to us as an Arts Primary because it gives our children a real diversity of learning. Working with professionals from Cummins has been a rewarding experience for our pupils and has enriched their skills-base as well as broadening their horizons.

Year 6 trip to Ramsgate Tunnels

Life in wartime Ramsgate has been experienced by children from Ramsgate Arts Primary School. The Year 6 pupils heard how lives of children and families were changed forever when WWII broke out 80 years ago. When the bombing raids headed across the English Channel to our shores, Ramsgate was one of the towns in the front-line of the attack. Tunnels dug into the chalk under the town subsequently became a safe-haven for residents who spent days and nights living and sheltering safe below ground.



Our Year 6 children were investigating what life was like for their counterparts in 1939 onwards as part of their World at War topic. It was fascinating for them to find out first-hand how people adapted to such a change in their lives. When the children went underground they wore hard hats and used torches and headed down the old railway tunnel to the smaller tunnels that were cut out for people during the air raids in 1940. There were parts in which they had to use torches as there were no lights whatsoever. At one point, they were about 70 metres below the surface of Ramsgate – the air felt very damp and chilly. They found out an interesting fact about navigation: the tunnels were designed to mimic the roads above so that people could gauge a rough idea of where they were underground. The children learned a lot about the lives of people in the 1940s living in Ramsgate and the visit to the tunnels is a really worthwhile experience.

Year 3 Pioneering Places Project

The latest in a series of workshops with partner Turner Contemporary at Margate saw the children discuss and create a range of ideas they would like to see in their home town including a new library and a hotel for homeless people complete with tiered bunk beds and a central food store. They also learnt how to design, saw and hammer wooden structures to create a possible living space using timber, trellis and poles, create fixtures and fittings for it including a roof terrace and a toilet for their space using clay and playdough, and they directed an architect to sketch ideas for the town, including an outdoor leisure area with a range of attractions and amenities.



Throughout the three year project, launched in 2018, the children have been working with Turner Contemporary Navigators, Jo Ursell and Lucy Pettet, the children's chosen artist Babalola Yusuf, and Heritage Researcher Libby Scarlett, who works alongside pupils in school each week. The children – known as Young Arts and Heritage Leaders - will drive the project until its conclusion in 2020, collaborating with Turner Prize winning collective Assemble, who led the recent two-day focus session. Through their work in the unique initiative they are exploring the heritage associated with the Royal Harbour and finding out what Ramsgate means to them and to its residents, connecting communities through the stories they uncover. It is planned that a major new artwork will be commissioned and installed near Ramsgate harbour.
